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I do recall something like this happening once (IIRC, I had done some punches & next time I opened up that project the punched-in segments were missing), but in my case it was a drive going bad... had some bad sectors on it. Only time I ever had a W-D drive go bad on me.

Gantt, did you already scan the drive for any bad sectors? If there are any bad ones, there's a way to isolate that section so that it doesn't try to write anything further to those regions, so that you can finish the project without having to move everything to a new drive right away. I forget how to do it, but surely someone here knows this method.
