I know someone in town here that has made a LOT of money doing this over the years with simple tools like Soundesigner, DNR and ProTools. It took him quite a while to be recognized as an "audio expert". As the person processing the files, you will be called upon to testify to your work and results. It took my acquaintance several years before he was actually accepted at face value (mostly because by that time, he had already worked for many of the lawyers!).
