Or get Disk Warrior, boot OSX off of its CD and use the included tools to rescue the OSX partition and back it up to an external drive.

Or take it to an Apple store genius bar along with your external drive, ask nicely and they'll run Disk Warrior and do the backup for you.

T key. This will put it into firewire target disk mode and the drives on
H will appear on the desktop of G.
