My question is... is there a way to control all active (active meaning there is something on the channel) channel faders at the same time? Another words, I have all the channel faders set properly, but I want to bring them all down a few db's. Is there a way to bring them all down at the same time without doing them individually?

Lastly, I don't have any automation set, so that won't be effected by this.

In fact, I try to stay away from automation because of this reason. There may be an easy way to "edit" the automation, but I haven't figured it out.

I just try to stay away from it. Some day I may delve into that learning process... lol. I am old school. Just use Paris for basic recording, mixing....

thanks in advance... and Happy New Year (2006)!Yes, you can use the normalize function to do this - bring them up or down.

For example say you want to lower them all by 3db. On an unused channel move its fader to 10 and then normalize with highest at 7. This brings down all faders by 3. (To bring them back up to where they were, normalize to 10.)
