I'm a fan of the Grisoft stuff. There's another free mob about too who are supposed to be good.

Nothing is perfect in Virusland of course, but Grisoft is free (for some uses), it's not bloated, it's stable, and while early on it used to miss things, I don't think I've seen it miss a virus for a couple of years, not that I get a lot of viruses near my system, but it's been good.

On a DAW I usually consider it more important to ensure system stability than protect against viruses. Virus protection on a DAW is best done by quarantine. Just make sure that it's not on the net and that any media you put on it has the extension "WAV" and you'll be right. ;o)

But you have nothing to lose by loading Grisoft AVG and trying it out, as it is free after all.
