I will be driving it with a 60wpc tube amp with a tube preamp front end. I want the elusive 'brown sound' distortion and super clear cleans... which the amp/preamp combo is certainly capable of giving me. It's the cabs that suck on my current gear (2 unmatched 2x12's) - I wish to move to one stereo matched cab, and I'm not afraid to rewire it if that matters.

Neil you're right regarding speakers. I had bad luck with a high wattage Celestion too though. The 30 watt greenbacks are good. Maybe not as easy to get that warmer distortion as the 25s from what=20 I've heard. Clean might be tougher with the 25s.

Aaron, what amp are you using? Do they make a matching cab?
What style of music?

Matching a different cab to an amp has been a less than fruitful process for me. The one thing I have learned is that more often than not the matching cabs are tuned to the amp. This makes for the best match generally. Fender amp/Fender cab. Marshall amp/Marshall cab. Try the emulators. I've found it to be pretty much the same there too. Certainly with Nigel and the Vox Tonelab.

Go to GC and try some cabs with your amp. Major differences will be heard. Then you'll be totally messed up!

Tom, sorry, I disagree... you don't have to match the cab to the amp; what he's looknig for is a loose-cone sound. Celestions are the ticket - though you may be right about going with a lower-wattage version if he can find it. Greenbacks, Goldbacks, Black&Goldbacks, it don't matter, just get something by Celestion & you'll get close enough to be within tweak range.

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I know you've gotten lots of opinions, but I'll toss in two more. For me, live playing with a closed back 4x12 in a room much smaller than Giants Stadium doesn't work well. The sound tends to 'beam out' in a very narrow range, usually directly at the guitarist's calves. So he turns up louder and louder until he can hear himself and then people near the stage are hallucinating. And not for a good reason. Second, I think 2x10 and 4x10 cabs sound better with 99% of the guitar/amp combinations out there. They lack some low end, which probably should be left for the bass in live situations anyway, but the entire midrange sounds way better to me usually.

I use a Top Hat combo that is basically a Vox AC-15 knockoff. Super clean is obviously not an option, but the single speaker sounds great. However, I tried it with a nice old 4x10 Fender cab it it was even nicer.

Boy, as a sound man I agree wholeheartedly about this. That's why I elevate and tilt my cabs live... I usually fly direct emulated signal at the PA and let them sweat the room. To be honest I use in ears about %99 of the time, and the cab is more for filling the hole in the center of the stage and providing the right kind of vibration relationship to the guitar feedback.... usually pointed right at me.

I built a 1960A clone cab for my lead guitarist. We loaded it with Eminence Legend 1258's and wired in stereo. He uses a 2120 into a Boogie 20/20 and gets some killer sounds IMHO. For a low power tube amp, that 20/20 can get louder than holy crap!! I'm not an expert on different guitar tones, I just know what I like when I hear it and this rig can sound pretty damn nice. Not really any good info for you here, I just saw you loved your 2120 as does he.

For a preamp setup, I use a Boogie triaxis with 90/90 power amp and 2 =
GK90s cabs and a TC electronics Gmajor

First off, the 60/60 is a very good stereo power amp - I wish I never =
sold mine. The 4 x6L6 give good clean transient response.

I used that with a Rockton preamp (solid state), ART multiverb III and a =
peavey 4x4 cab loaded with celestion GK90s and wired in stereo for =
years.

That was a good combo because the power amp saturated gracefully, the =
pro G.A.P had a ton of gain and the cab had a very beefy low mid =
resonance - which compensated for the thinness of the preamp. It was a =
huge stereo sound that I liked at the time - and I was competing with =
Marshalls which sounded much worse, i.m.h.o.

(BTW Celestion changed their manufacturing base - they make the GK90s in China now, Boogie didn't like them and requested that they custom make 90's for them - I believe they are called the 'Filmore'). I also have GK90s (Filmore) in all my cabs and combos - so yes I like them, and overall I find them to be very versatile. They are great clean and dirty - but they are 90 watts a piece!!!. You have to push them a bit to get the tone.=20

For a more warmth at lower levels you might like the vintage 70s or sidewinder - check out some Marshall cabs with vintage 30s also. Make sure that your cab can handle the power of your amp.

As for tubes - 6L6s have wider bandwidth (brighter/fuller), EL34s roll off the highs/earlier (darker/thinner), the non linear stuff is very subtle at low volumes. I view power amp distortion as an added bonus - during transient peaks your amp won't flat line, it basically logarithmically compresses. But if you set a working distortion sound with power amp saturation - it won't be good for much else as any signal with dynamic range will sound distorted (flubby).=20

As with any guitar rig, it's very subjective - a different player + same combo of stuff can yield vastly different results. Experiment and have fun!!!.

Turned out he's also a guitar player. He plays through an tube stack of his own and he was obviously underwhelmed by my stage gear. Being diplomatic, he said, "whatever works for you." But he didn't quite disguise a bit of stack snobbery. He obviously had low expectations for the rig.

Then we played our show. He had complete control, the guitar sounded huge through the PA (and the violin, which I also route through the GNX4, also sounded great). There were no stage volume issues. The band was tight, and we had a fun show. Afterwards I asked again if he liked my "stack."

He loved it. Said it sounded GREAT. Mind changed.

The next band had the requisite Marshall guitar amp, 4/12 cab and a similarly sized bass rig. Aimed strategically at the back of each player's knees and CRANKED. The sound guy had no chance to control anything in the moderate-sized club, Their set was mush from the getgo.

Maybe because my 1x12's were custom built and based on an old Pacific (Michael Forest) design and employ high grade, slow growth, light-but-dense Norwegian fir. I use just one primarily but when the stage is big enough and the players be fine, I switch the old 50/50 to stereo and run the twin cabs about 20' apart, 10' away, pointing back, up and and slightly in and jump feet first into what one of my gig compadres calls "one big luxurious stereo sonic bathtub."
