Second, this was my first time tracking a band, I usually just track midi stuff, so working with warm bodies playing real-time was quite nifty.

We're going to tracks some vocals tomorrow, so there's still more fun to come... and then we're on to mixin' hehe.

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Hey Rich,

We ended up tracking the drums, two guitars and bass live. We overdubbed the vox and a guitar solo and some additional guitar parts at the studio. I ran the extra guitars to Paris through a Beringer Vamp Pro. We've been A/B'ing the mix against a bunch of tunes by Audio Slave. I'm pretty amazed that for a hack job, our mix is holding it's own.

By the way, it was kind of cool, the guitar player plays through a Marshall and selected ("blind") the Marshall emulation on the Beringer unit.
