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Here's some observation a jazz drummer friend of mine, Dave Calarco, offered regarding this. Thought you might be interested in his insight and experience. He's been around a while.

"Yeah man things aren't always what they look like. That system is very inaccurate in tuning drum heads exact. You may be able to increase the overall tension but you can't really tune the head harmonically to itself. Each head tunes completely different depending on the relationship between the head and the collar and the collar and the bearing edge of the drum. Plus I heard from guys that it has to constantly be tightened as the whole thing tends to shift on the drum shell especially at higher tensions. "Uni tuning" has been around for a while and it's never really caught on in the industry. There's no substitute for a good ear and the know how to properly tune a drum head."
