They do have a ways to go, however, there are a few things to consider with Apple. The value is hard to see unless you really look at what your getting for the money. With Apple you get a printer for free after rebate, that's \$100.00. With the educational discount you would get 10% off and get a free iPod, that's four to five hundred bucks. With the ADC discount you can get 20% off the price of a new Mac. The software that comes with a Mac like the iLife suite, Front Row multi media software with the Apple remote, iChat AV etc. would be in the \$500.00 to \$600.00 range if you had to purchase something comparable for the Dell. The operating system is also something to really consider. Of course some people don't need a free printer, iPod, and will never use a program like Photo Booth, so it really depends on your needs and what you want.

One other point, and it's a bit of a stretch. If you were looking at cars, and one had a plastic body and the other had an aluminum body, you would expect to pay more for the aluminum body. The MacBook Pro has an air craft grade hardened aluminum body. The case is aluminum, not just a thin aluminum cover over plastic or an entire plastic case.

By the way, the prices on MacBook Pros will drop, the machines will get faster, and they will have the new operating system loaded between Oct. and Jan 08", so you might want to wait, if your actually considering a MacBook Pro.

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Hey Lamont - my rig only goes online to grab updates to audio apps, registration/response codes (which is getting annoying), but never a problem with that. Let me know how Nuendo runs on your new Mac though, seriously. You'll have to wait for N4 to run on the dual core 2 Mac under OSX at least (should be soon). I would be most interested in a head to head comparison of plugin counts in the same project under Nuendo, not just similar projects, but identical.

The last report I read comparing XP to OSX for DAW performance was from Derek (used to be on this NG) - German Keyboards compared them and apparently (I don't read German to confirm) XP won on plugin count and low latency by a noticeable margin on the same hardware (even when run on the same system as OSX via Bootcamp). He said even Logic ran better outside OSX, but I'm not sure how that comparison was made since Logic 5 (Win) and Logic 7 (OSX) might not be comparable. If OSX was a standalone OS, I would buy it to have both and compare, but the fastest processing, lowest bloat-factor OS would inevitably be the DAW system of choice for me.

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Gas? Probably not - it seems to be a fair question -

....but how could Apple sell OSX unsupported? AFAIK (from past corporate support experience) I don't think it is legal in the US to sell a product retail without some level of support unless the product is completely unsupported and sold as a non-retail product (e.g. can't make a Mac version with full support and a PC version for the same price and none, but you could sell OSX for both platforms with limited support).

Regardless, as has been said before iWork is extra, not included, so that doesn't count. iLife is \$79 to upgrade to the new version, so it isn't exactly an OS "feature", and it's a home user/recreational set of tools, not something I would consider a must for professional use (iChat might come in handy for client communication, but Skype works quite well for free). iLife is an app just like any other.

\$299 for OSX? If it really provided some specific advantage for the price, but it's more than I pay for WinXP (I only pay \$139 for WinXP Pro (OEM) since I build my own machines (e.g. that meets the license requirement for the OEM version). Like Dave, I don't need iLife - just an OS, stripped down running fast. iWork might come in handy for only \$79 vs. MS Office since I don't need the full capabilities of Office and do get MS Word and Excel docs from clients, but again, it is an add on, not an OS feature.

Beyond that, I'm not what the context of your question is. Is Apple considering such a move?

Two system drives destroyed by kernel panics (an OS should \*never\* crash a drive at the hardware level), a bad motherboard, and a bad combo drive, all on the same Mac in 2 years - not a great record for quality parts. There is more to the story than the single argument about viruses, and that's my main point. I'm always keeping my options open, and may move to Macs at some point if it makes me more efficient and/or profitable, but comparing the performance vs. cost is a big deal when I can build 2 PCs for the cost of 1 Mac, with identical hardware, and get double the processing capability (or more) by doing so. For what I do, that's not a trivial point. And, imho, that's the biggest hurdle for Macs with pro audio PC users, not virus susceptibility (when that is a known, as it is now) or nice looking GUIs - just simple power vs. cost.

If I could access the German Keys mag report I would post the results as it apparently found that OSX isn't exactly as fast or low latency friendly as WinXP, even under Bootcamp, but I don't have numbers to confirm, and that's 2nd hand info. That's where the rubber meets the road for me and a lot of other audio-PC users. I don't know too many people that are in love with Windows (I'm certainly not) - just getting the most for our money. Until Apple takes interest in that side of the equation, MS will continue to dominate the market in general. I would have no problem switching if I truly would get more for my money with a Mac running my given applications (no, Bootcamping XP isn't a feature when you pay several hundred \*extra\* for BIOS locked hardware to have it).

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I wasn't actually talking about Walmart or 7-11....I was asking a serious question, not taking a swipe at Apple's distribution. There are plenty of online retailers in general - I was just curious about brick and mortar since it's rather difficult to test drive anything other than music and video online. I also don't really care how many stores Dell has. I've never bought one, owned one or shopped for one.

Maybe it is different in your state, but CompUSA is the only store here in Colorado Springs that carries Macs, and it is a separate section. Best Buy does not, Circuit City does not, Staples doesn't, OfficeMax and Office Depot don't, and we don't have an Apple Store (there is one in Denver, but that's the closest). That's one place to go and try before you buy, if that matters to new customers.

There is no Apple product specialist on hand - just a CompUSA staff kid, same as every other department. It must be quite expensive to staff a store with an Apple rep - probably one reason the case and OS cost so much more. ;- ) (the cases are quite nice).

And fwiw, nothing survives Best Buy, so I don't know if distribution there is good or bad in reality...not a model store for support or quality sales - it's just big and that's about it. Nothing stops people from locking up comps except the store/staff logins, which many are using now to require users to get an employee to demo the comp for them - that's true for Mac or PC.

But also fyi, Apple didn't become a second class product unless Apple allowed it be viewed that way, nor is it somehow a superior, elitist "experience" by allowing certain stores to carry them only if they setup a separate section for their products. It's just a PC (personal computer) with a different wrapper, but of course, the best snow falls from marketing departments.....
