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Configure your computer as a dual boot machine and use Win ME for Paris. It sounds to me like you've got some IRQ issues with the EDS card(s) sharing with either your video card or whatever else you are using for Cubase SX. check your device manager so see how your ITRQ's are being shared. Paris runs nicely on Win ME, but it won't if work any better then XP if you've got an IRQ conflict. . You're on the right track however. Tracking in Paris and mixing in Cubase is a dream come true.

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Make sure the hyperthreading is turned off in the BIOS. I don't think Paris
likes it, or it likes Paris. You may want to go through the steps of
configuring Windows XP. I don't think Windows XP right out of the box will
work. You need to turn off services and things that are going on in the

background. IRQ's could be the problem too.
