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Yep, that's the header info. ;o)

You need to either:

Download a program called "stripwav" and use it to strip the header info. It comes as a shareware option which you would be able to use to get the job done if it's a one off...

....Or...

....there is an option menu somewhere in wavelab which turns the header info off. If you switch that and resave the wavs you'll be cool. I beleive the tick box refers to the header info as something like "Broadcast Wavs" or something. If you find a tick option in wavelab for "broadcast wavs" turn it off and re-open and re-save the files and you should find you're cool.

Mind you you might be cool already, but you'll be even cooler. ;o)
