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Try PAPST 80mm 12V fans. (made in germany)

There are two interesting models:

PAPST 80mm, 12dB, N/2GLE

PAPST 80mm, 19dB, N/2GMLE

All are top quality, excelent airflow and quiet.

Note that lower noise means slower spin speed...

....so I think 12db (decibel) model which rotates at cca1500rpm is ok for most MECs.

But, if your MEC is crowded with expansion cards (4 or more), go for 19db model (cca2000rpm)

They are not cheap, but they are good.

Also note that a little soldering must be made to move connector from old fan to new...

Papst has 3 wires:

Blue (-) minus

Red (+) 12v plus

White (rotation) - N/C on paris psu.
