The Steinerphone is a "midi" trumpet controller. It uses fingering similar to the 3 valves of a trumpet that work by touch, with some other modifications. It makes no sound of it's own and is attached to it's own synthesizer, which in turn can also be linked or sent out to other synth modules. The nice thing is I can play up to 8 octaves with it, and have quite a bit of control over the sound. You don't vibrate your lips as you do in a trumpet mouthpiece cup, you just blow into a rubber mouthpiece, which if you bite into it and bend it a little will allow you to glissando up or down. You can also bend notes, and use natural vibrato and use different types of attack. You can also play chords with it. So it is a very expressive instrument. I NEVER use it with trumpet patches. Don't like them, and I can play my own with my regular trumpet, but I use it with sounds I find "interesting." It is fun to be able to play another instrument that is familiar in the fingering sense, yet so different in timber. I can play drums or piano or strings or anything I want with it. I use it to compose sometimes too. A very

high tech instrument and no toy! The model I have has been discontinues by Akai, but I believe there are newer models available if people are interested. It also has a saxophone sister, which Michael Brecker used to play called the EWI (Electronic Wind Instrument). Mine is also called the EVI (Electronic Valve Instrument). Out of respect, I call it (and so do they) the Steinerphone after Niles Steiner, it's inventor, who worked with Akai to have it produced. Hope that helps.
