What I'm wondering about are removable solid state "drives" or flash cards that plug directly into the express card slot. Express card media.

True, and that may be an option. The drawbacks are that external hard drives are bulky, make noise, require connecting with cables (possible points of failure) and are somewhat fragile for on-location use. Which is one reason I'm curious about the current state of solid state express card drives.

This would be used for video recording via Quicktime Pro or with dedicated video recording/monitoring software like Scopebox. One situation where direct laptop recording may make sense is when doing interviews.
