I use them all the time for rendering tracks to send to people. Sinus Golden Gate has worked good for me also. The Sonalksis analog gates are supposed to be great also, although my experience with them is limited. I like using gates because I like to let a little bleed happen, and all the gates I listed let you do that. I've tried automation, but I can hear it. I can hear the faders ramp up a split second before the event occurs. Maybe I'm crazy.
