I do have a problem when believers insist that only their beliefs are true, and that everyone must live according to those beliefs. This includes preventing schools from teaching things that may contradict their beliefs. "Science is a religion, too." Uh huh. And lions were once vegetarians.

I also have a problem with religious fanatics who long for Armageddon so much they want to help it along so Jesus will come back. And we're all too familiar with the ones to think committing mass murder/suicide will land them in some kind of cross between Heaven and a whore house. (Why 72 virgins? Isn't one enough? OK, maybe two . . .)

Pete objects to the child abuse chapter. The title of the chapter in the book is "Is Religion Child Abuse?" and the answer is, "it can be." Ritual genital mutilation anyone? Enough said. Or how 'bout a Muslim child being indoctrinated with the belief that believers of any other faith are less than human and deserve to die and that the best thing in life to strive for is martyrdom? Maybe believers are drawn to religion because they have so little faith in their own goodness. But I, for one of millions, do not believe in God, Heaven, or Hell except as metaphors, and yet here I am . . . no trail of dead bodies, no plundered wealth, no criminal record, and I'm a nurse with a reputation for being exceptionally empathetic and kind. People can be honest and kind just because they respect the rights and feelings of others . . . no deity required. The "Golden Rule" provides its own rewards and punishments.

I'm going out on a limb here, but I'm gonna turn this argument around and say that if someone really needs the threat of Hell, the enticement of Heaven, and a list of God's rules to be a good person, perhaps he or she is not in possession of a conscience.

Anyway, I recommend the book. He's an amusing writer and makes a pretty good case for the argument that religion is purely a human invention.

One, while some atheists are as closed-minded and unjustifiably certain of their position as the worst of Christian fundies, these are individuals, and not representative of all atheists. Most atheists simply do not see any reason to believe in God, and to attempt to diminish that position by claiming that "lack of belief is itself belief" is just illogical. Some people need reason to believe, and given insufficient reason, will not believe.

Two, every time someone tries to show me why I should believe the Bible is the word of God (including a bunch of those little videos you linked . . . I didn't watch all of them), there seems to be this hint of desperation to save their beliefs from the brutal onslaught of logic and in some cases, history. The problem is, most every argument I hear is basically "the Bible is the Word of God because it says it is." The conclusion is contained in the premise. Where I went to school, that's called circular logic or "begging the question."

Some of the videos focused on the reliability of the authors of the three synoptic gospels, written 50 - 90 years after Jesus' death. I'm sure they were swell guys who felt they had an important story to tell, but I'm just speculating, as is anyone else who claims to know their methods and motivations.

But belief in the good intentions of Matthew, Mark, and Luke is yet another belief layered over the belief in question, i.e., "The Bible Is the Word of God."

I don't really expect or need an answer to this, I just like to question beliefs. I suspect the reason people believe that the Bible is the Word of God is simply that they have chosen to believe that. And that's OK with me. Whatever floats your boat.

I myself believe that human beings were genetically designed by extraterrestrials using modified ape DNA who then turned us loose in the jungle to see what would happen. That's right, we're just ants in some alien kid's terrarium, and if we don't stop stinking up his room with CO₂, he's gonna take us out in the back yard and blast us with a garden hose.
